1. CALL TO ORDER

Dr. William Hallerberg called the meeting to order and noted that a quorum was present. No conflict disclosure issues pursuant to Local Government Code Chapter 176 were noted by Board members related to action items on today's agenda.

2. INVOCATION

Dr. William Hallerberg gave the invocation.

3. PUBLIC COMMENT

In accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act, Chairman Hallerberg asked if any members of the public were present to comment on agenda items. There being none, he continued the meeting.

4. **MINUTES**

Sheriff Sal Rivera moved to approve the minutes from the meeting held on June 25, 2020, as received. Judge Dan Looten seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

5. **VOUCHERS**

Judge Harold Keeter moved to approve the vouchers for the month of June, 2020. Mr. Winston Sauls seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

6. **PRPC INVESTMENT FUNDS QUARTERLY REPORT**

Mr. Trent Taylor stated that pursuant to the Public Funds Investment Act, which was passed by the Texas Legislature in 1987 and amended in 1995 and 1997, PRPC adopted written investment policies on August 23, 1996 for funds under our control. In accordance with this Act, the investment officer of PRPC, which is the Finance Director, is required to submit to the Board of Directors a quarterly report of investment transactions. Mr. Taylor presented the report for the period of April 1, 2020 through June 30, 2020.

Mayor Tobe Shields moved to accept the PRPC's Investment Funds Quarterly Report for the period ended June 30, 2020, as presented. Commissioner Pat Sims seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

7. **2020-2021 PRPC PERSONNEL CLASSIFICATION, PAY PLAN AND JOB DESCRIPTION DOCUMENT ADOPTION**

Mr. Kyle Ingham reminded the Board that the Planning Commission can trace its employee classification and pay plan system back to 1974 when the Board of Directors hired the Chicago, Illinois consulting firm of Public Administration Services, Inc., to develop a position classification plan, pay plan and model job descriptions. That work has served as the basis for all subsequent PRPC classification and pay plan documents. The Planning Commission adopted major updates to the classification pay plan and job descriptions in 1984 and again in 1996.

On an annual basis since 1997, the Board has approved several relatively minor amendments to the PRPC's classification and pay plan system primarily in order to maintain compliance with personnel management requirements placed upon regional councils by the Texas Legislature. The primary revisions for 2020 – 2021 include:

1) The establishment of the following positions and their associated job descriptions:

- Executive Assistant
- Receptionist
- Economic Development Recovery Program Specialist
- Regional 9-1-1 Network/Information Technology Program Coordinator
- Area Agency on Aging Administrative Assistant

2) The following job descriptions are newly activated:

- Local Government Services Coordinator
- Local Government Services Coordinator (Transportation Planning & City Management Services)

3) The following job descriptions are newly inactive:

- Executive Manager
- Regional 9-1-1 Network/Information Technology Program Specialist

Sheriff Sal Rivera moved to adopt the 2020-2021 Personnel Classification, Pay Plan and Job Description document for the Planning Commission. Mr. Winston Sauls seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

8. **U.S. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION (EDA) CORONAVIRUS AID, RELIEF, AND ECONOMIC SECURITY (CARES) ACT RECOVERY ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAM RESOLUTION**

Mr. Marin Rivas stated that the U.S. EDA received significant funding through the Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act and is seeking appropriate projects to respond to and recover from impacts of the pandemic and the Workforce Development (WD) Division is on the frontlines of responding to the economic conditions created through the unprecedented disaster of COVID-19. The staff of this Division is

actively working to provide the necessary training and assistance to help regional workers and employers get back to work and start on the path of recovery and they are actively looking for ways to further increase the necessary service delivery components to provide recovery and resiliency to the region.

He stated that PRPC has the option to purchase the current WD building which would alleviate the annual rent payments of approximately \$500,000/year. This would allow the redirection these funds back into service delivery and thereby increase the efficiency and effectiveness of the WD programs. This purchase can increase its effectiveness in dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic through a direct increase in WD and subsidized child care service delivery, and thereby training and placing more low-income workers in jobs throughout the region.

The option for PRPC to purchase the building through the existing lease agreement is for approximately \$2.5 million and the potential project will likely necessitate further building renovations. PRPC has approached the City of Amarillo about providing a bus stop directly at the facility to allow for public transportation to and from the facility and providing a more direct impact for customers, especially for the Texas Workforce Solutions Vocational Rehabilitation Services, a required partner in the facility providing services for individuals with disabilities. The anticipated overall project will be approximately \$3 million, to allow for the purchase of the facility and the renovations necessary to allow for the increase in program service delivery.

The EDA CARES Act Grant program requires a match of 80/20 for potential projects, however, considering that this project will have a direct impact in the entire PRPC region which includes 26 counties, 63 municipalities, approximately 26,000 square miles and a population of over 430,000, PRPC has requested that EDA consider a 90/10 or 100% grant rate to allow for funds not spent on purchase and renovations to go back into service delivery.

Judge John Howard moved to approve a resolution to allow for PRPC to submit an application to the Economic Development Agency (EDA) and commits PRPC to the necessary matching funds, for the consideration of grant funding to purchase the Workforce Development building and make the necessary building and parking lot improvements. Judge Dan Looten seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

9. **PANHANDLE REGIONAL 9-1-1 NETWORK TEXT CONTROL CENTER RECONFIGURATION CONTRACT**

Mr. Mike Peters stated that by converting our systems to the Emergency Services Internet Protocol, ESInet, project that was approved with AT&T in June, will require our existing Text Control Center, (TCC), services from Intrado Life and Safety Solutions to be reconfigured. The text messages that are routed over our Address Location Interface, (ALI), links, will be rerouted over to the ESInet and this is important because our current ALI links will be removed upon completion of the ESInet project. These expenses have been approved and will be reimbursed from the Commission on State Emergency Communications.

He also stated that HGAC Buy Pricing from Intrado Life & Safety Solutions Corporation would perform the above services for each of the areas 22 call centers with a project cost of \$22,000 or \$1,000 per location.

Mayor Buster Davis moved to authorize the Executive Director to execute a contract with Intrado Life & Safety Solutions to reconfigure the region's equipment to continue to receive text messages through the AT&T ESInet. Commissioner Pat Sims seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

10. **PANHANDLE REGIONAL 9-1-1 NETWORK EMERGENCY SERVICES IP NETWORK MIGRATION CONTRACT**

Mr. Mike Peters stated that in conjunction with the AT&T ESInet network project the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 hardware and software need to be reconfigured to work with the new network. It is necessary to purchase Session Interface Protocol (SIP) licenses for each of the call taking positions. The technicians will reprogram, test, and migrate each site and position from the old 9-1-1 system to the new system. They will also build i3 profiles. He stated that the National Emergency Number Association (NENA) i3 profile is the first version of the Next Generation 9-1-1 system design and this IP-based inter-network will eventually be shared by all agencies and allow transfers of information between regions across the state. All of these upgraded systems will communicate using Internet Protocol (IP) and they should be easily adaptable for future technology changes.

He also said these expenses have been approved and will be reimbursed from the Commission on State Emergency Communications.

HGAC Buy Pricing from Intrado Life & Safety Solutions Corporation will perform the above services as well as purchase and configure four firewall devices to protect the Panhandle's systems from any malicious data.

Judge Don Allred moved to authorize the Executive Director to execute a contract with Intrado Life & Safety Solutions to reconfigure the region's equipment to work with the network services. Sheriff Sal Rivera seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

11. DOWNTOWN REVITALIZATION APPLICATION DEVELOPMENT AND MANAGEMENT SERVICES INTERLOCAL CONTRACTS

Ms. Paige Witthar reminded the Board that PRPC staff has worked with Panhandle communities to write applications and implement various projects through the Community Development Block Grant (TxCDBG) Program since 1983. Through the CDBG program the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) offers many different funding opportunities that include: Community Development Infrastructure Improvement Program (CD), Fire, Ambulance and Service Truck (FAST) Program, Planning and Capacity Building (PCB), State Urgent Need (SUN), Texas Capital Fund (TCF) and the Downtown Revitalization Program.

The Downtown Revitalization Program stated objectives are for the elimination of slum or blight conditions in the downtown areas of communities by providing assistance for public infrastructure improvements, especially sidewalks and ADA compliance. The cities of Canyon, Dumas, Pampa, Silverton, Spearman, Wellington and Wheeler are already working on application preparation. Most recently the City of Borger has expressed a desire to seek funding through this program to improve the blighted conditions through infrastructure improvements in their downtown areas.

Following the format that has become the new standard for TxCDBG applications; an interlocal agreement has been developed for PRPC to assist all of the above-mentioned cities with an application to the Downtown Revitalization Program. In order to comply with TDA requirements as well as maintain the long-established tradition of conducting application development at no charge to communities in the region, the interlocal agreement is two parts:

Part 1 - Application development will be conducted at no cost.

Part 2 - An option to for an Amendment to be consider contingent upon funding for Project Management Services.

Historically, these are all activities conducted by PRPC staff on projects and applications. However, in order to comply with TDA requirements it is necessary for the City of Borger to enter into an interlocal agreement with PRPC for application development activities to ensure programmatic compliance.

Sheriff Sal Rivera moved to authorize the Executive Director to execute an Interlocal Cooperation Contract with the City of Borger for PRPC to provide TxCDBG Downtown Revitalization application services at no cost with contingency for administrative services to be amended at the localities discretion if a project is funded. Mayor Tobe Shields seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote. Mr. Winston Sauls abstained from voting.

12. CHIEF OF POLICE RECRUITMENT SERVICES INTERLOCAL CONTRACT

Mr. Dustin Meyer reminded the Board that in recent years PRPC staff has assisted many cities in the Texas Panhandle with administrative services, ranging from contractual city management services to city manager searches to codification. One of the most increasingly demanded services is assistance with the recruitment of professional staff by cities. Recently, PRPC was approached by the City of Dumas related to conducting a professional search for a police chief.

The City of Dumas has inquired about PRPC's services and requested a proposal regarding the process to identify qualified police chief applicants. The Dumas City Council has considered the PRPC's scope of services as it relates to assistance with a professional search and has authorized an interlocal agreement to perform these services. The inclusion of this agenda item will allow the PRPC Board of Directors to consider entering into interlocal agreement with the City of Dumas for PRPC to continue to work with the City and assist them in this process.

Currently the search contract rate being used by PRPC will follow basic guidelines that can be modified based on locality preference. The contract will be focused so that the services can be rendered expeditiously and in a quality manner so that the City can resume normal operations quickly. Compensation will be rated at \$65.00 per hour with job postings and travel compensated additionally with a floor of \$3,000 and a ceiling of \$7,000 to ensure that both parties mutually benefit from the agreement.

The following options will be made available for inclusion in contracts:

Search Services

1. Develop a Job Description
2. Post the Position notice as directed by the City.
3. Receive copies of all applications submitted to the City and review them.
4. Set up interviews with qualified candidates.
5. Check references and internet history as directed by the City.
6. Make recommendation on a short list of qualified applicants.
7. Contract negotiations with a qualified applicant.
8. On-Site services as required by the City Council related to the Search.

Sheriff Sal Rivera moved to authorize the Executive Director to execute an Interlocal Cooperation Contract with the City of Dumas to conduct a formal Chief of Police Search. Mr. Winston Sauls seconded; the motion carried by unanimous vote. Commissioner Pat Sims abstained from voting.

13. 2021 REGIONAL WATER PLAN BUDGET MODIFICATION REQUEST AND CONSULTANT SERVICES CONTRACT AMENDMENT

Mr. Dustin Meyer stated that in June 2019, the PRPC Board of Directors authorized Amendment #5 of Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) Contract #1548301829 to accept all Tasks and funds associated with a total \$671,294 Regional Water Planning Contract for the 2021 Plan. At that point the contract was fully funded for the completion of the 2021 Panhandle Regional Water Plan.

As the region moves towards the completion of the 2021 Panhandle Regional Water Plan it has become evident that a large portion of the funds budgeted for the administration of the project will not be accessible to PRPC for expenditure under the contract. When the application and contract were developed, it was hoped that a portion of these funds could be utilized for staffing and associated costs, but unfortunately the TWDB determined that staffing and associated costs would not be eligible with TWDB dollars in this planning cycle. Fortunately, these costs have been covered by generous local contributions to the regional planning process.

However, with the increased requirements added to the regional planning process throughout this five-year planning period the costs to sub-contractor Freese & Nichols Inc. have skyrocketed above the \$595,294 contracted for planning services. The TWDB has indicated that it would allow PRPC to move the unutilized administrative funds to the contractual side of the agreement to help address the additional work that Freese & Nichols Inc. has provided to the region.

PRPC proposes to move the unutilized funding, \$59,000, reserved under the "Other Expenses" line item as well as the \$6,000 "Voting Planning Member Travel" of the administrative expenses to contractual expense under TWDB Contract #1548301829. Local Government staff has consulted closely with the Finance staff to ensure that this is both an appropriate and logical use of the remaining funds and that there is no other option by which PRPC could access these funds.

Judge Ronnie Gordon moved to authorize the Executive Director of the PRPC to modify the regional water planning contract with the Texas Water Development Board authorizing the above noted movement of funds under TWDB Contract No. 1548301829 through a Budget Memorandum and authorize the corresponding change to the FNI subcontract. Judge Ernie Houdashell seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

14. CONSULTING SERVICES INTERLOCAL COOPERATION CONTRACT

Ms. Katie Perkins reminded the Board that PRPC staff has provided a multitude of professional services which include: professional recruitment and searches, strategic planning, grant application development and administration, contract city management and interim city manager services. Recently, PRPC was approached by the Village of Palisades about a complete revision, update, and codification of their existing ordinances.

The Village of Palisades has inquired about PRPC's services and requested a proposal regarding the process to complete a revision and codification of their code. The Village's Board of Aldermen has considered the PRPC's scope of services as it relates to assistance with this service and has authorized an interlocal agreement to perform these services. The inclusion of this agenda item will allow the PRPC Board of Directors to consider entering into interlocal agreement with the Village of Palisades for PRPC to continue to work with the Village and assist them in this process.

Currently the contract rate being used by PRPC will follow basic guidelines that can be modified based on locality preference. The contract will be focused so that the services can be rendered expeditiously and in a quality manner so that the Village will be able to consider, adopt, and enforce the revised Code. Compensation will be rated at \$65.00 per hour with travel costs billed additionally, with a floor of \$1,500 and a ceiling of \$4,500 to ensure that both parties mutually benefit from the agreement.

The following options will be made available for inclusion in contracts:

Revision and Codification Services

1. Review the current Village of Palisades' Code of Ordinances.
2. Enter current ordinances, including amendment, into electronic format for future use, modification, etc.
3. Propose new ordinances, revised ordinances, or amendments to ordinances for Board review.
4. Research the development of current Ordinances in regards to past Ordinances.
5. Provide a review of the Village of Palisades' Code of Ordinances in comparison with State and Federal statutes.
6. Provide comparative examples of working ordinances by Villages of similar size and composition.
7. Provide an overview of Village services as they are established by Village Ordinances.
8. Coordination of a series of Board meetings (up to eight) regarding the review and update of the Village of Palisades' Code of Ordinances.

Mayor Ricky White moved to authorize the Executive Director to execute an Interlocal Cooperation Contract with the Village of Palisades to conduct a revision and formal codification of the Village Code of Ordinances. Ms. Irene Favila seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

15. REGIONAL PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION COORDINATION PLANNING CONTRACT

Ms. Katie Perkins stated that since 2006, the Panhandle Regional Organization to Maximize Public Transportation (PROMPT) has worked to plan for regional public transportation and coordinate with and amongst public transportation providers in the Panhandle. Every five years PROMPT goes through a large Regional Transportation Plan Update process, and in 2011 they identified several priorities which were included in that Plan Update. The most recent iteration of the Plan was formally adopted in 2017. Priorities identified through the coordinated planning process include access to higher education, Veterans and Medicaid Transportation, and other transportation needs. The region is now preparing for the 2022-2027 planning cycle to commence.

In this planning cycle, PRPC submitted an application for funding for the 2022-2027 5 Year Regionally Coordinated Transportation Planning effort, which has been reviewed favorably by TxDOT. Public Transportation Division staff has presented a funding recommendation for PRPC at \$130,000 over an 18 month period. This funding recommendation will be presented to the Texas Transportation Commission on July 30, 2020. TxDOT staff expects the funding recommendation to be approved.

The deliverables over the eighteen month planning cycle are as follows:

1. Inventory of Regional Public Transportation Assets
2. Identification of Public Transportation Needs
3. Development of a Regional Public Transportation Plan
4. Adoption & Implementation of Regional Public Transportation Plan

These deliverables are similar to those included in the last planning cycle, which resulted in the adoption of the 2017-2021 Regionally Coordinated Transportation Plan. PRPC staff plans to complete a comprehensive update, which will include new data collection, assessment of existing transportation assets, identification of gaps and needs in transit for the region, and the adoption of the final 2022-2027 Regionally Coordinated Transportation Plan. This regional planning document is increasing in importance from both practical and funding perspectives each year. PRPC staff feels that the

development of this regional plan with the guidance and insight of the PROMPT is a highly important process for many jurisdictions and residents of the Texas Panhandle.

Judge Ronnie Gordon moved to authorize the Executive Director to sign the project grant agreement for funding of the 2022-2027 Regionally Coordinated Transportation Planning grant. Mayor Buster Davis seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

16. REGIONAL PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION COORDINATED CALL PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT CONTRACT

Ms. Katie Perkins stated that in January of 2020, the Panhandle Regional Organization to Maximize Public Transportation (PROMPT) Board authorized the submission of an application to the Texas Department of Transportation under the 2020 Coordinated Call for Projects grant program. This application is for the development and implementation of a region-wide public information campaign and launch of a website to contain transit information. This project is aimed at increasing access to transit for low-income, elderly, and disabled individuals in the region in the form of correct, up to date, and easily accessible information.

Project partners in coordination on this project will include the City of Amarillo, Panhandle Community Services, CORD Care, along with the members of the PROMPT board. Elements of the project will include public meetings to collect input from riders, community members, and transit providers which will inform the format and type of information that is desired by the public to improve access to transportation.

TxDOT has favorably reviewed the application proposal and TxDOT staff presented a recommendation for funding to the Texas Transportation Commission in June. The funding recommendation of \$125,000 was authorized by the Texas Transportation Commission with a grant agreement start date of September 1, 2020.

PRPC staff has been in communication with the Texas Department of Transportation and expect to receive the program grant agreement this month.

Ms. Irene Favila moved to authorize the Executive Director to execute the program grant agreement with the Texas Department of Transportation to receive the 2020 Coordinated Call grant funding to develop a comprehensive regional public transportation information campaign. Judge Don Allred seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

17. CIVIL RIGHTS ACT COMPLIANCE PLAN UPDATE

Ms. Katie Perkins reminded the Board that PRPC has worked with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) since 2007 as the Lead Agency on Regional Public Transportation Planning. This process has resulted in the adoption of the 2007, 2011, and 2017 Regional Public Transportation Plans and interim studies and projects focused on Veteran's Transportation Needs, Access to Higher Education opportunities, and transportation coordination with schools throughout the region. Each of these projects has been useful and a step in the right direction for public transportation in the region.

In 2017, TxDOT asked all agencies involved in planning activities, but not directly involved in providing transportation services to adopt a Title VI plan to address access of minority and limited English Proficiency individuals to public transportation. This plan is similar to language adopted by transportation providers across the state of Texas.

The Board of Directors formally adopted the 2017 Title VI plan on August 31, 2017. This plan is set to expire on August 17th, 2020. TxDOT has asked PRPC staff to make minor revisions to the plan, which includes updating the effective dates and demographic information contained within the plan.

The Title VI plan is required for PRPC to continue to receive planning funds for the Regionally Coordinated Transportation Plan and other planning projects funded through the Texas Department of Transportation. This plan is only applicable to public transportation planning activities of PRPC. The Plan itself is logical and beneficial in that it does allow for the continued formal process regarding access to the planning process for these targeted groups.

TxDOT has requested that the plan be submitted for review prior to its formal adoption by PRPC. PRPC staff has submitted the plan for TxDOT review and expect to receive feedback soon.


Judge Dan Looten moved to accept staff's recommendation that this item be tabled until the August 2020 meeting of the Board as PRPC is still waiting on the Plan. Commissioner Pat Sims seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

18. MISCELLANEOUS NON-ACTION INFORMATION ITEMS

- A. Mr. Kyle Ingham thanked the Board for their attendance and discussed the plans for the PRPC's Annual Meeting. He also briefly discussed the Area Agency on Aging COVID-19 relief gift card program.
- B. Chairman Hallerberg appointed a committee to select recipients of the 2020 Panhandle Regional Planning Commission Regional Services Award, 2020 Goodwin Regional Public Administrator Award and the 2020 PRPC Exceptional Staff Member Award. Members of the Committee are: Judge Ronnie Gordon, Mayor Tobe Shields and Commission Juan Cantu.
- C. Chairman Hallerberg appointed a Nominating Committee to consider a slate of officers for the 2020-2021 PRPC Board of Directors. Those members are: Mayor Ricky White, Ms. Karen Price and Judge Nancy Tanner.
- D. Mr. Kyle Ingham reported on the recent and upcoming Planning Commission sponsored regional meetings.

19. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting adjourned at 2:44 p.m.
