1. **CALL TO ORDER**

Judge John James called the meeting to order and noted that a quorum was present.

2. **INVOCATION**

Judge Ronnie Gordon gave the invocation.

3. **MINUTES**

Mayor Paul Harpole moved to approve the minutes from the meeting held on June 25, 2015, as received. Mayor Ricky White seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

**4. VOUCHERS**

Ms. Irene Favila moved to approve the vouchers for the month of June, 2015. Judge Don Allred seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

**5. PRPC INVESTMENT FUNDS QUARTERLY REPORT**

Ms. Cindy Boone, CPA, stated that pursuant to the Public Funds Investment Act which was passed by the Texas Legislature in 1987 and amended in 1995 and 1997, PRPC adopted written investment policies on August 23, 1996 for funds under our control. In accordance with this Act, the investment officer of PRPC, which is the Finance Director, is required to submit to the Board of Directors a quarterly report of investment transactions. Ms. Boone presented the report for the period of April 1, 2015 through June 30, 2015.

Mayor Brian Gillispie moved to accept the PRPC's Investment Funds Quarterly Report for the period ended June 30, 2015, as presented. Judge John Howard seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

**6. PANHANDLE REGIONAL 9-1-1 NETWORK QUARTERLY PERFORMANCE REPORT**

Mr. Mike Peters stated that as stipulated in the agreement between Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) and the Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC), the Panhandle 9-1-1 Network must establish and accomplish certain goals and objectives. In order to check progress throughout the year, we are required to submit to CSEC a quarterly performance report that includes 9-1-1 call volumes, monitoring results, network outage reports, system testing, and the status of equipment replacement. Mr. Peters stated the following items make up the key points of the FY15 Q3 performance report covering March, April and May:

- 14 Public Service Answering Points (PSAPs) were monitored with no findings
- 2,986 network test calls were made by PSAP staff and PRPC employees
- The program experienced no outages during this period
- There were 69,139 9-1-1 calls with almost 87% being wireless compared to the same quarter in 2014 with 42,678 calls and 81% wireless

Judge Don Allred moved to accept the performance report as submitted for the third quarter of FY 2015 covering March, April, and May, as presented. Judge Ronnie Gordon seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

**7. 2015-2016 PRPC PERSONNEL CLASSIFICATION, PAY PLAN AND JOB DESCRIPTION DOCUMENT ADOPTION**

Mr. Gary Pitner reminded the Board that the Planning Commission can trace its employee classification and pay plan system back to 1974 when the Board of Directors hired the Chicago, Illinois consulting firm of Public Administration Services, Inc., to develop a position classification plan, pay plan and model job descriptions. That work has served as the basis for all subsequent PRPC classification and pay plan documents. The Planning Commission adopted major updates to the classification pay plan and job descriptions in 1984 and again in 1996.

On an annual basis since 1997, the Board has approved several relatively minor amendments to the PRPC's classification and pay plan system primarily in order to maintain compliance with personnel management requirements placed upon regional councils by the Texas Legislature. The primary revisions for 2015 – 2016 include:

- 1) Adjusting the lowest level entry salary on the Annual Salary Table for General Classified Positions from \$21,398 to \$21,933;
- 2) Adjusting the maximum level on the Annual Salary Table for General Classified Positions from \$96,921 to \$99,344;
- 3) Adjusting the maximum on the Annual Salary Table for Exempt Classified Positions from \$145,000 to \$149,240 (consistent with corresponding Exempt State Classification as approved in the 2016-2017 General Appropriations Act).
- 4) The establishment of the following positions and their associated job descriptions:
  - Accountant III
  - Regional 9-1-1 Network Program Administrative Assistant
  - Regional 9-1-1 Network Geographic Information Systems Administrative Assistant
  - Area Agency on Aging Program Specialist (Caregiver Specialist)
  - Area Agency on Aging Information, Referral and Assistance Administrative Assistant
  - Workforce Development Planning Coordinator
  - Workforce Development Program Specialist
  - Workforce Development Fiscal Administrative Assistant – Contract Services
  - Workforce Development Fiscal Administrative Assistant – Program Services

- 5) The deletion of the following positions and their associated job descriptions:
- Computer/Personnel Manager
  - Payroll Administrative Aide
  - Finance Clerk
  - Regional 9-1-1 Network Operations Coordinator
  - Regional 9-1-1 Network Geographic Information Systems Program Specialist
  - Regional 9-1-1 Network Program Aide
  - Regional 9-1-1 Network Database Program Aide
  - Workforce Development Associate Director

Councilwoman Zelda Lang moved to adopt the 2015 – 2016 Integrated Personnel Classification, Pay Plan and Job Descriptions document as proposed. Judge John Howard seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

8. **2015 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT COMPREHENSIVE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGIES (CEDS) APPROVAL**

Mr. Kyle Ingham reminded the Board that PRPC has served as the fiscal and administrative agent of the Panhandle Economic Development District for more than 15 years. Every three years PRPC seeks funding from the U.S. Economic Development Administration to facilitate the planning and implementation of economic development related strategies in the Texas Panhandle. Currently, the Economic Development District is in the second year of its current three year grant.

Each year PRPC staff works with the membership of the Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC) to update the region's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS). This document analyzes the population and economic trends of the region and its communities while identifying the needs and strategies appropriate to help sustain and expand local economies. The CEDS includes a Strength/Weakness/Opportunity/Threat (SWOT) analysis on economic trends in the region. The CEDS also identifies economic development resources and strategies available to local communities, entrepreneurs, and businesses in the region. Each EDAC member provides insight into the specific issues facing their respective counties.

The EDA requires that the EDAC review the CEDS annually prior to submission. Because of this, historically, the CEDS had not been presented to the PRPC Board of Directors for review and approval. However, beginning in 2012 it was determined that as the economic development efforts of the region continue to become more intertwined with local government it has become appropriate for the annual updated CEDS to be reviewed by the PRPC governing body. Though the approval of the CEDS by the PRPC Board of Directors is not required, staff feels that the formal approval of the plan will lead to increased formal recognition of the plan, a better regional understanding of its importance, and a more formally recognized document to submit to the funding agency.

Mayor Ricky White moved to approve the 2015/2016 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS) document, as presented. Judge Wayne Nance seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

9. **FY2015-2016 COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE FUND CONTRACT**

Mr. Kyle Ingham reminded the Board that since 2004 PRPC has contracted with the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) which is responsible for the Texas Community Development Program Block Grant (TxCDBG) Program to receive Community and Economic Development Assistance Fund (CEDAF) funds. These funds are used by the PRPC to provide general assistance to cities and counties in our region regarding the Texas Community Development Program.

TDA has made available \$5,835 in CEDAF funds for the upcoming fiscal year. This is slightly lower than in 2014, and less than 50% of levels of five years ago. Items contained in the proposed scope of work include provision of census and demographic data; attend/host TDA workshops; one fair housing activity; and distribution of program information on behalf of TDA. No assistance will be made to the regional review committee with these funds nor will any of these funds be used for project management or project specific items.

Since PRPC assists communities with the administration of TxCDBG projects, we are eligible only for 50% of the regional allocation that would be available if we did not administer projects. However, being that PRPC staff currently is assisting in the administration of almost 20 CDBG related projects it appears that the benefit of our administrative services greatly outweighs the additional CEDAF funds forfeited.

The correspondence relating to this contract extension was received on July 10, 2015 and requires action by August 7, 2015. In each year since 2004, the PRPC Board of Directors has unanimously agreed to authorize the Executive Director to enter into the annual CEDAF contract.

Judge Harold Keeter moved to authorize the Executive Director to execute a contract with the Texas Department of Agriculture for funds to support community and economic development assistance activities by the Planning Commission in the Texas Panhandle. Mayor Ricky White seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

10. **PANHANDLE REGIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY COMPUTER EQUIPMENT TRANSFER**

Ms. Lori Gunn stated that PRPC Administrative Regulation #31 governs the duties, activities and composition of the Panhandle Regional Solid Waste Management Advisory Committee (RSWMAC). The RSWMAC is comprised of twenty-two (22) to twenty-eight (28) PRPC-appointed members, and one (1) to two (2) standing positions held by representatives from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality-Region One Office. Members are appointed to three-year, staggered terms. The RSWMAC composition must maintain a cross-section of solid waste professionals from the Panhandle Region.

Each year on July 31<sup>st</sup>, approximately one-third of the appointed terms expire and those members must either be replaced or re-appointed. No member may serve more than two consecutive three-year terms.

Currently, nine individuals need to be appointed or re-appointed to the RSWMAC to meet the PRPC administrative standards. PRPC staff has contacted each nominee and determined they are willing and able to serve if appointed by the PRPC Board. Those individuals are:

Councilman Kerry Symons moved to appoint/reappoint the recommended individuals to serve on the Regional Solid Waste Management Advisory Committee. Councilwoman Zelda Lang seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

11. **PANHANDLE REGIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY COMPUTER EQUIPMENT TRANSFER**

Ms. Lori Gunn reminded the Board that the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Training Academy (PRLEA), which provides Basic Law Enforcement Training, In-Service Training and Advanced Specialized Training services, has been operated by Amarillo College under contract with the PRPC since its inception. Licensed officers from the region can attend any PRPC sponsored In-Service Course of 20 hours or less at no cost. The majority of the In-Service courses delivered through the PRLEA are less than 20 hours.

However, with In-Service courses that are 20 hours or more in length, the PRPC collects a minimal tuition co-pay from each attending student. Those co-payments are deposited into the PRPC's Out-of-Region Training Fund and are typically used to assist officers in traveling outside the region to obtain training that cannot feasibly be delivered in-region.

The PRPC currently has a balance in its ORT account with no requests in the pipeline. Per our contract with the Governor's Criminal Justice Division (CJD), which supplies the grant funding to support the operation of the PRLEA, any program income not spent by the end of the contract period must be given to CJD. CJD considers the tuition co-pays to be program income. PRPC staff met with the PRLEA Director on June 5<sup>th</sup> to discuss options for effectively using the balance of ORT funds to benefit the entire region. Two options were discussed; those were:

1. To conduct a Specialized Training course that would be open to all licensed peace officers in the region at no cost called "*Combat Thinking for LE Officers*". This course is actually designed to benefit officers and their significant others (both can attend at no cost) as it helps them both to cope with the pressures of being a law enforcement officer, on the job and off.
2. To equip a computer lab at the PRLEA. The Academy frequently delivers training that currently relies on the students to come into the classroom equipped with their own laptops. Often, students will neglect to bring their laptop to class or the operating system on their computer is so dated that it cannot interface with the software being used as part of the training. This option would also include the purchase of a wireless printer that could be shared by all students in the lab.

Ms. Gunn stated that with a little over \$10,500 remaining in the PRPC's ORT account, there's enough funding to fulfill both options. PRPC staff was of the opinion that both would have benefit to the region. Therefore, we requested and received authorization from CJD to use the remaining ORT funds for these purposes. The Combat Thinking for LE Officers course will be delivered sometime before August 31 and the PRPC has already moved on procuring the laptops (off the DIR contract) and the wireless printer. However, technically, until the ownership status changes; the equipment is owned by the PRPC and the responsibility for keeping it maintained also belongs to the PRPC.

With this agenda item, staff is asking the PRPC Board of Directors to consider authorizing the PRPC Executive Director to transfer the ownership of the ORT-funded equipment to Amarillo College. In exchange, the College would have to agree to carry the new equipment on its inventory and insurance roll, be responsible for keeping the equipment in good repair and for updating computer software as necessary throughout its useful life.

Mayor Brian Gillispie moved to approve the transfer of 10 laptop computers and one printer from the Planning Commission to the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy operated by Amarillo College. Judge Wayne Nance seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

## **12. PANHANDLE REGIONAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS**

Mr. John Kiehl stated that PRPC Administrative Regulation #36 governs the duties, activities and composition of the Panhandle Regional Emergency Management Committee (PREMAC). The advisory committee is comprised of 40+ PRPC Board-appointed members who geographically represent the broad spectrum of emergency management interests in the Texas Panhandle.

Currently, there are 10 open seats that have to be refilled as a result of naturally-expiring terms. We've also had six other members who've resigned from the committee for one reason or the other. The disciplines represented by these off-going individuals included Law Enforcement, Related Federal Agency, Health/Medical Services, Local Government and Transportation. In order to bring the committee to its full complement, we also needed to find individuals who can fill these open slots.

Mr. Kiehl reviewed the individuals listed below for appointment/re-appointment to the PREMAC. PRPC staff has contacted these individuals and they're all willing to serve if reappointed by the Board.

Judge John Howard moved to appoint/reappoint the recommended individuals to serve on the Planning Commission's Regional Emergency Management Advisory Committee. Alderman Bob Gober seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

13. **PANHANDLE REGIONAL INTEROPERABLE COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (PANCOM) TOWER CONSTRUCTION SERVICES CONTRACT**

Mr. John Kiehl stated that on June 8, PRPC staff issued a Request for Bids for the furnishing and installation of two (2) 300-foot guy-wired public safety communications towers as part of the FY14 State Homeland Security Program (SHSP)-funded PANCOM Tower Project. The deadline for the receipt of bids was July 10. The PRPC received 12 bids by the deadline. Mr. Kiehl reviewed in detail the summary below of the tower bids for Briscoe County and Dallam County.

He stated that PRPC staff has focused its attention on evaluating the three lowest bids; those coming from, Tower Service Company, Quality Tower Service and Houston Tower Service. We've back-checked the references provided in the bids, as well as checking with other previous clients, where they can be found, to confirm the quality of the bidder's work on past projects. PRPC staff has worked with Tower Service Company on numerous occasions and while we have some concerns about the company's past performance; we haven't uncovered any compelling justification as to why in this case, the PRPC should not accept the lowest bid.

Judge Ronnie Gordon moved to award the tower construction contract to Tower Service Company of Canyon, Texas to construct communication towers in Briscoe and Dallam Counties to support the Panhandle Regional Interoperable Communications System (PANCOM). Judge Wayne Nance seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

14. **PUBLIC HEARING – POTTER/RANDALL/CITY OF AMARILLO/VILLAGE OF LAKE TANGLEWOOD/PANHANDLE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION HAZARD MITIGATION ACTION PLAN UPDATE**

At 2:35 p.m. Judge John James opened the public hearing regarding the Potter/Randall Hazard Mitigation Action Plan dated July, 2015 covering Potter County, Randall County, the City of Amarillo, the Village of Lake Tanglewood and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. Mr. Kiehl explained the purpose of the public hearing and asked

for public comment. No public comment was given. Judge John James closed the public hearing at 2:45 p.m.

15. **AMARILLO POTTER/RANDALL HAZARD MITIGATION ACTION PLAN UPDATE ADOPTION**

Mr. John Kiehl stated that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) administers a variety of hazard mitigation grant programs that can be used to harden a jurisdiction against the damaging effects of natural hazard events; those which occur with some frequency. To be eligible to receive hazard mitigation grant funds, a jurisdiction must first develop and then maintain a hazard mitigation plan, written to FEMA standards and finally approved by FEMA. The plans have to be updated and reapproved by FEMA at least every 5 years in order to maintain grant-funding eligibility.

For the past three-and-a-half years and having gone through three different planners, a team of stakeholders from the Potter and Randall County area have worked to update the original mitigation plan developed for the Amarillo/Potter/Randall County (APR) area in 2006. The team, referred to in the updated plan as the APR Mitigation Action Team or "MAT", included representatives from the City of Amarillo, the Village of Lake Tanglewood, Potter County, Randall County and the PRPC. Lake Tanglewood did not participate in development of the original APR MAP but has now joined itself to the plan as part of this update process.

Mr. Kiehl stated that now what we've done is to consolidate the unique hazard mitigation needs of each of the participating jurisdictions, including the PRPC; under one cover. The City of Amarillo, Potter County, Randall County and Lake Tanglewood participated in the development of this document and over the next month, each will separately consider the adoption of this plan. In order to continue supporting regional projects like the Safe Room Rebate Program or the Regional Mass Notification System Project; the PRPC also had to appear in the plan as a participant. Mr. Kiehl reviewed the plan in detail with the Board and asked them to formally adopt the APR MAP with the passage of a resolution.

Judge Ronnie Gordon moved to adopt the July, 2015 Potter/Randall Hazard Mitigation Action Plan covering Potter County, Randall County, the City of Amarillo, the Village of Lake Tanglewood and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission with the passage of a resolution. Councilwoman Zelda Lang seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

16. **MISCELLANEOUS NON-ACTION INFORMATION ITEMS**

- A. Mr. Gary Pitner informed the Board that the 2015 PRPC Annual Meeting has been set for Thursday, September 17, at the Amarillo Civic Center Heritage Room.
- B. Chairman James appointed the following individuals to serve on a committee to select recipients of the 2015 Panhandle Regional Planning Commission Regional Service Award and the 2015 Goodwin Regional Public Administration Award: Judge Jay Mayden, Mayor Ricky White and Judge Dan Looten.
- C. Chairman James appointed the following individuals to serve on a Nominating Committee to consider a slate of officers for the 2015-2016 PRPC Board of Directors: Judge Wayne Nance, Alderman Bob Gober and Judge John Howard.
- D. Mr. Gary Pitner reported on the recent and upcoming Planning Commission sponsored regional meetings.
