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Request for Proposal

1. General Information and Background

a. Summary

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) is soliciting proposals from competent vendors to replace the 9-1-1 front and back-room equipment throughout its region.

b. Background

The Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network aims to provide the most reliable, functional, and current means to ensure the highest possible quality of 9-1-1 service to the citizens of the Texas Panhandle. Due to the critical nature of emergency communications, equipment must be replaced systematically to adhere to current industry standards to increase stability and efficiency. The Regional 9-1-1 Network will be replacing this equipment in the next year.

1. Equipment Pertaining to Proposal

The Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC) defines Customer Premises Equipment (CPE) in Public Policy Statement 028 Exhibit A as follows:

"CPE resides at the Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP), with the specific functions of receiving the 9-1-1 call and displaying the data transmitted with the call."

1. Front Room

Front-room equipment refers to the components of the 9-1-1 call-taking equipment located at the telecommunicator's workstation. This equipment may include (but not limited to) a computer, display monitor(s), keyboards, headsets, etc.

2. Back Room

Back-room equipment refers to the hardware at the termination point where the Automated Number Information (ANI)/Automated Location Information (ALI) and database networks connect. This equipment may include (but not limited to) servers, computers, display monitors, keyboards, etc.

2. Current Infrastructure

The Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network currently has one stand-alone host, one host with an in-house PSAP, and twenty additional remote PSAPs.

1. Host

The equipment at the hosts is responsible for the ingress of both 9-1-1 calls and texts, and the timely and accurate call-routing to the appropriate PSAP. The equipment ensures the proper delivery of ANI/ALI with the call, as well as mapping functionality and integration to the PSAP, and offers full redundancy in the event of a host outage.

2. Remote

The equipment at the remote PSAP is capable of receiving 9-1-1 calls with ANI/ALI, and integrating that information into a graphic user interface (GUI) that allows the call to be answered, geographically displayed on a map, transferred, redialed, etc.

2. Scope of Work

The proposal shall provide a comprehensive equipment solution that includes, but is not limited to the following components:

a. Call Ingress & Delivery

Equipment must be able to receive and deliver 9-1-1 voice calls from the ESInet to the appropriate PSAP in a timely and accurate manner. Voice calls must be delivered to the PSAP in accordance with National Emergency Number Association (NENA) standards and Next Generation 9-1-1 (NG9-1-1) equipment operational requirements.

b. Call-Taking

Call-taking equipment must be capable of receiving 9-1-1 voice calls. Equipment must be able to integrate ANI/ALI and location information into the GUI and display that information on a map. Equipment must be capable of transferring and connecting calls without losing ANI/ALI information between Network PSAPs and NG9-1-1 compliant Sites. Equipment must have ability to program speed-dial/direct dial transfer to Poison Control, Language Line, and other entities as needed by network staff. Equipment must have call-back and dial out capabilities. Equipment must be capable of handling teletype (TTY) calls. Call-taking equipment must be compliant with NENA and NG9-1-1 equipment operational requirements.

c. Text to 9-1-1

Equipment must be capable of receiving and sending text messages in accordance with NENA and NG9-1-1 equipment operational requirements. Equipment must be capable of integrating any ANI/ALI or other locating information into the GUI. Equipment must be able to transfer text messages to PSAPs capable of receiving them.

c1. Multimedia Messaging Service (MMS)

Equipment must be able to, or capable of upgrade as future capabilities allow for the delivery of MMS to the PSAP GUI in accordance with NENA and NG9-1-1 equipment operational requirements.

d. Redundancy

a. Host Redundancy

Each host should be capable of call ingress and delivery functionality for the entire Regional 9-1-1 Network in the event of failure at the other host.

b. Call-Taking Equipment Redundancy

Each PSAP shall have at least two or more fully redundant call taking positions with the number of positions per PSAP listed below.

e. Failover

Equipment must be capable of automatically redirecting full functionality in the event of an outage. Equipment must be capable of automatically returning to normal once the outage is remedied. Equipment must be capable of routing calls to alternate PSAPs automatically or manually, if needed. Equipment must be capable of automatic interoperability transitions to utilize the PANCOM radio network as a backup network in cases of primary network failure.

f. Graphic User Interface Functionality/Capabilities

Proposal will include images and/or videos with explanations of the capabilities and customization of the GUI features of the call-taker position. Proposal will include images/or videos with explanations of the capabilities and customization of the configuration portion of the back-room equipment as applicable.

g. Call-Taker Map

Proposal will include images and/or videos with explanations of the capabilities and customizations of the map features. Proposal will demonstrate the data upload process to apply the latest mapping updates to the call-takers' positions.

h. Reporting

Equipment must be capable of delivering call data to the E-Cats reporting software in accordance with NENA and NG9-1-1 equipment operational requirements.

i. Interoperability

Equipment must be capable or have the ability to upgrade to ensure the interoperability with 3rd party vendors such as RapidSOS, etc.

j. CAD Spill

Equipment must be capable of delivering ANI/ALI through a one-way spill that may be used for CAD systems, recorders, or other hardware/software that may require the data.

k. Installation:

a. Deployment Schedule and Seamless Transition

Proposal will outline a deployment schedule and strategy accounting for geographic restraints and seamless transition with little to no loss of 9-1-1 operation or functionality throughout deployment. Proposal will state the amount included for travel during the installation.

b. Training

Proposal will outline a comprehensive training program for call takers, dispatchers, administrators, and technical personnel to ensure a functional transition to new software and hardware capabilities. Selected vendor will provide training documentation, walkthroughs, manuals, etc.

c. Testing

Proposal will provide a thorough testing schedule to ensure that full functionality has been met, including, but not limited to, hardware and software functionality, failovers, contingencies, etc. Issues will be addressed and rectified as needed during the testing phase.

d. Data Migration

Proposal will show a plan to ensure that any relevant 9-1-1 data in the prior system will be migrated into the new system and maintain its data integrity and accessibility.

l. Cybersecurity:

Proposal will demonstrate a plan to safeguard digital assets and sensitive information.

3. Project Timeline

The project timeline is expected to be completed within 3 months of acceptance of proposal, in accordance to the deployment schedule set forth within the proposal.

4. Equipment & Hardware Detail

All equipment will be itemized by position and site name, and the following will be displayed both individually and comprehensively on a per site basis:

- a. Manufacturer
- **b.** Part Number
- c. Description
- d. Quantity
- e. Unit Price

5. Extended Support & Warranty

a. Warranty Specifications

The proposal will lay out a 2-year extended warranty that covers hardware and software outlined within the proposal. Warranty maintenance must be performed by the vendor, at no cost to the PRPC for the first year following acceptance of completion.

b. Duration

The extended support and warranty will have a minimum duration of 2 years beginning one year after the final completion of the implementation. If the extended warranty goes beyond the manufacturer warranty, the proposal will outline when the warranty will be transferred to selected vendor. Duration may be negotiated, as needed.

c. Coverage

The extended warranty will cover all components, hardware, software and equipment listed in the proposal. Timely technical support will be available 24 hours a day, every day of the year. If remote access is required, proposal will demonstrate methods to achieve that within proposal. Software updates will be provided and training/assistance will be available for system users and administrators as needed throughout the duration of the extended warranty. Extended warranty will cover the timely and seamless replacement or repair of components to minimize downtime or disruption of functionality.

d. Documentation

Terms of the extended warranty will be detailed, and will outline the terms, conditions and coverage of the warranty.

e. Renewal

Proposal will outline options for renewal of the extended warranty.

6. Proposal Requirements

a. General Specifications and Requirements

1. General Required Information

- a. Legal name of firm
- b. Contact person and contact information (phone, address, e-mail)
- c. Date of firm formation
- d. Legal business description (Individual, Partnership, Corporation, Joint Venture, etc.)
- e. Evidence of licensure to do business within the State of Texas
- f. Evidence of liability insurance and amount of coverage

2. Qualifications and Availability

- a. Provide a statement of interest for the project, including firm's history, a narrative describing the firm's specific expertise and unique qualifications as they pertain to this particular project.
- b. Provide a statement on the availability and commitment of the team to undertake the project.
- c. Provide an organizational chart for personnel (including consultants) who are to work on this project. Include the role they will play in the project.

3. Duration of Proposal

Proposal will remain valid for a minimum term of 180 days from the closing of the proposal due date.

4. References

Proposal will provide verifiable examples of at least three equipment replacements completed in compliance with NENA and NG9-1-1 equipment operational requirements with integration into the current ESInet. Examples will include the services provided, project completion date, completed cost, client agency, and the contact person involved with the project within the agency.

5. Background Checks, Identification, Notice

All technicians may be required to pass background checks, must wear identification at all times when on project sites. Technicians must provide ample notice to all sites prior to install dates.

6. Good Standing

Proposal vendor must show good standing status with the Texas State Comptroller's Office and the Federal System for Award Management.

7. Enhancements or Deviations

Proposal will include justifications and/or explanations of deviations from the stated criteria. Proposal will include a complete description of any additional competitive enhancements which offerors wish to be considered in the evaluation.

8. Tax Exemption

The PRPC 9-1-1 Network is a sales tax-exempt organization. A Texas Sales & Use Tax Exemption Certificate will be provided with the order.

9. Damages

Proposal must state that the parties agree to indemnify and hold harmless the PRPC 9-1-1 Network Staff, The PRPC, its officers, agents and employees for any damages concerning the undertaking and execution of any subsequent contract.

10. Required Documentation

Proposals must also must complete and include (in all copies of proposals) Attachment 1 (Contractor Proposal cover sheet), Attachment 2 (Bidder/Offeror Certification), and Attachment 3 (Bidder/Offeror Affirmations). Attachment 4 (Contractor Certification - Federal Uniform Guidance Contract Provisions) and Attachment 5 (Contractor Certification Regarding Lobbying) are for reference purposes and will need to be signed by the Contractor who attains the bid.

b. Cost

All cost of hardware, software, training, licenses, services, travel rates and expenses, etc., will be outlined in the proposal. Cost will be broken down on an individual item level, and on a per-site level as follows:

 - a. One Year Warranty
 - b. Year Two & Three Warranty
- 4. Other

7. General Conditions

- **a.** The purpose of this request for proposals is to ensure uniform information in the solicitation of bids and procurement of services. This proposal is not to be construed as a purchase agreement or contract or as a commitment of any kind; nor does it commit the PRPC 9-1-1 Network to pay for costs incurred prior to the execution of a formal contract or purchase order unless such costs are specifically authorized in writing by the PRPC 9-1-1 Network.
- **b.** The PRPC 9-1-1 Network reserves the right to accept or reject any or all proposals received, and or cancel or reissue this proposal in part or its entirety.
- **c.** The PRPC 9-1-1 Network reserves the right to negotiate the final terms of all contracts or agreements with offeror(s) selected.
- **d.** Misrepresentation of the offeror's ability to perform as stated in the proposal may result in cancellation of any contract or agreement awarded.
- **e.** Offerors shall not under penalty of law, offer or provide any gratuities, favors, or anything of monetary value to any officer, member, employee, or agent of the PRPC 9-1-1 Network for the purpose of having an influence toward their own bid or any other bid submitted hereunder.
- **f.** No employee, officer, member, or agent of the PRPC 9-1-1 Network shall participate in the selection, award, or administration of a contract if a conflict of interest, or potential conflict, would be involved.
- **g.** Bidders shall not engage in any activity, which will restrict or eliminate competition. Violation of this provision may cause an offeror's bid to be rejected. This does not preclude joint ventures or subcontractors.
- **h.** Any offeror may withdraw their proposal either in person or by written request by a duly authorized representative at any time prior to the scheduled closing time for receipt of bids.

8. Evaluation and Selection

Each proposal must conform and be responsive to the terms, conditions and specifications listed throughout this request for proposal. The proposal must meet or exceed stated requirements in order to be considered responsive. The PRPC 9-1-1 Network reserves the right to reject all proposals or to waive any irregularities in any proposals, and be the sole judge of the merit and qualifications of products and services offered, and may accept whatever proposal, or whatever portion of the proposal, is deemed to be in the best interest of the PRPC 9-1-1 Network.

a. Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Review Committee

A subcommittee of the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network Advisory Committee was formed to create a scoring metric to score the bids. This committee will also review the sealed bids with 9-1-1 Network Staff, and present their recommendations to the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network Advisory Committee.

10. Conclusion

Upon receipt of the proposals by the stated deadline, the selection committee will evaluate the respondents' qualifications and rank them based on the criteria in Section VI of this document. The selection committee may select the highest ranked firm or may interview a short list of firms. The result of the selection process shall be presented to the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network Advisory Committee, and then the PRPC Board of Directors with a recommendation for selection. PRPC will then begin negotiations with the selected offeror. If negotiations are not successful, negotiations will commence with the next highest rated offeror.

Acceptance of evaluation methodology: By submitting a proposal in response to this RFP, respondents accept the evaluation process and acknowledge/accept that the determination of the "most qualified" offeror may require subjective judgments by Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network Review Committee.

Part 200). Part of this process involves ensuring that its vendors and contractors (collectively herein, "Contractor") agree to comply with federal contract provisions (2 C.F.R. § 200.327). The contract provisions are taken from Appendix 11 to Part 200 - Contract Provisions for Non-Federal Entity Contracts Under Federal Awards Additional and/or supplemental contract provisions included in the Certification are derived from the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Contract Management Guide (June 2021).²

This Certification is required when 9-1-1 Entity expends federal funds for any contract or other form of agreement including purchase order. Contractor will be compensated for work performed and accepted and goods accepted by 9-1-1 Entity as of the termination date if the agreement is terminated for convenience by 9-1-1 Entity. Any agreement is not exclusive and 9-1-1 Entity reserves the right to purchase goods and services from other vendors when it is in 9-1-1 Entity's best interest.

(C) <u>Equal Employment Opportunity.</u> Except as otherwise provided under <u>41 CFR Part 60</u>, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in <u>41 CFR Part 60-1.3</u> must include the equal opportunity clause provided under <u>41 CFR 60-1.4(b)</u>. in accordance with <u>Executive Order 11246</u>, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (appears at <u>30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 CFR Part, 1964-1965</u> Comp., p. 339), as amended by <u>Executive Order 11375</u>, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity" (appears at 32 FR 14303, 3 CFR, 1966-1970 Comp., p. 684, EO 12086 of Oct. 5, 1978, 43 FR 46501, 3 CFR, 1978 Comp., p. 230, EO 13665

of April 8, 2014, 79 FR 20749, EO 13672 of July 21, 2014, 79 FR 42971), and implementing regulations at <u>41</u> <u>CFR part</u>

§Q, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor."

Additional/Supplemental Provision: If not already Addressed, Contractor agrees as follows:

Pursuant to Title 2 C.F.R. Appendix II to Part 200 Federal Rule (C), when 9-1-1 Entity expends federal funds, the equal opportunity clause required by 41 CFR 60-1.4(b) is incorporated by reference as permitted by 41 CFR 60 1.4(d). Notwithstanding being Addressed, each nonexempt prime contractor must include the equal opportunity clause in each of its nonexempt subcontracts.

(D) <u>Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C. 3141-3148)</u>. applicable definitions including "mechanic" and "laborer."}

Additional/Supplemental Provision: If not already Addressed, Contractor agrees as follows:

Pursuant to Title 2 C.F.R. Appendix II to Part 200 Federal Rule (D), when 9-1-1 Entity expends federal funds for a prime construction contract in excess of \$2,000 the provisions at 29 C.F.R. 5.5(a)(I)-O0) are incorporated in full by reference into all applicable contracts, and all applicable Contractors must include these provisions in full in any subcontracts. Regarding Compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act, Contractor shall comply with 18 U.S.C. § 874, 40 U.S.C. § 3145, and

the requirements of 29 C.F.R. Part 3 as may be applicable, which are incorporated by reference into the agreement. Regarding subcontracts and the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act, Contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above applicable to Contractor and such other clauses as Treasury may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime Contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses.

Breach. A breach of the contract clauses above may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and subcontractor as provided in 29 C.F.R. § 5.12.

(E) Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Appendix II to Part 200 Federal Rule (E), when 9-1-1 Entity expends federal funds for a contract in excess of\$100,000 involving the employment of mechanics or laborers Federal Rule (E) is incorporated by reference and the agreement is revised to include the following from 29 CFR § 5.S(b)(I)-(4):

- (1) Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one- half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.
- (2) Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(l) of this section the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(l) of this section, in the sum of \$27 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(l) of this section.
- (3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. The CSEC or 9-1-1 Entity shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(2) of this section.
- (4) Subcontracts. Contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (b)(l) through (4) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (b)(l) through (4) of this section.

In addition to the preceding clauses from 29 CFR § 5.5(b)(l)-(4), and in accordance with 29 CFR 5.5(c), if the agreement is subject only to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act and not to any of the other statutes cited in § 5.1, the contractor or subcontractor shall maintain payrolls and basic payroll records during the course of the work and shall preserve them for a period of three years from the completion of the contract for all laborers and mechanics, including guards and watchmen, working on the contract. Such records shall contain the name and address of each such employee, social security number, correct classifications, hourly rates of

wages paid, daily and weekly number of hours worked, deductions made, and actual wages paid. The records to be maintained under this clause shall be made available by the contractor or subcontractor for inspection, copying, or transcription by authorized representatives of the Department of Treasury, CSEC, 9-1-1 Entity and the Department of Labor, and the contractor or subcontractor will permit such representatives to interview employees during working hours on the job.

(F) Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement. If the Federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 CFR § 401.2 (al and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401. "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency.

Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the non- Federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671g) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

<u>Additional/Supplemental Provision:</u> If not already Addressed, Contractor agrees as follows:

Pursuant to Title 2 C.F.R. Appendix II to Part 200 Federal Rule (G), when 9-1-1 Entity expends federal funds for a contract in excess of \$150,000 Contractor agrees as follows:

<u>Clean Air Act:</u> Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 *et seq.* Contractor agrees to report each violation to the 9-1-1 Entity and understands and agrees that the

9-1-1 Entity will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to Treasury, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.

Contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by Treasury.

<u>Federal Water Pollution Control Act:</u> Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. § 1251 *et seq.*

Contractor agrees to report each violation to the 9-1-1 Entity and understands and agrees that the 9-1-1 Entity will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to CSEC, Treasury, and the appropriate <u>Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office</u>.

Contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by Treasury.

(H) <u>Debarment and Suspension (Executive Orders 12549 and 12689)</u> - A contract award (see <u>2 CFR 180.220)</u> must not be made to parties listed on the governmentwide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with the 0MB guidelines at <u>2 CFR 180</u> that implement Executive Orders 12549 (appears at 3 CFR part 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (appears at 3 CFR part 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549.

Additional/Supplemental Provision: If not already Addressed, Contractor agrees as follows:

Pursuant to Title 2 C.F.R. Appendix II to Part 200 Federal Rule (H), Contractor certifies and agrees as follows:

<u>Suspension and Debarment:</u> The agreement with the 9-1-1 Entity is a covered transaction for purposes of 2

- (ii) Telecommunications or video surveillance services provided by such entities or using such equipment.
- (iii) Telecommunications or video surveillance equipment or services produced or provided by an entity that the Secretary of Defense, in consultation with the Director of the National Intelligence or the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, reasonably believes to be an entity owned or controlled by, or otherwise connected to, the government of a covered foreign country.
- (b) In implementing the prohibition under <u>Public Law 115-232</u>, section 889, subsection (f), paragraph (1), heads of executive agencies administering loan, grant, or subsidy programs shall prioritize available funding and technical support to assist affected businesses, institutions and organizations as is reasonably necessary for those affected entities to transition from covered communications equipment and services, to procure replacement equipment and services, and to ensure that communications service to users and customers is sustained.

As used in this clause, the terms backhaul; covered foreign country; covered telecommunications equipment or services; interconnection arrangements; roaming; substantial or essential component; and telecommunications equipment or services have the meaning as defined in FEMA Policy 405-143-1, Prohibitions on Expending FEMA Award Funds for Covered Telecommunications Equipment or Services (Interim), as used in this clause-(b) *Prohibitions*.
- Section 889(b) of the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2019, Pub. L. No. 115-232, and 2 C.F.R. § 200.216 prohibit the head of an executive agency on or after Aug.13, 2020, from obligating or expending grant, cooperative agreement, loan, or loan guarantee funds on certain telecommunications products or from certain entities for national security reasons.
 - Unless an exception in paragraph (c) of this clause applies, the contractor and its subcontractors may not use grant, cooperative agreement, loan, or loan guarantee funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to:Procure or obtain any equipment, system, or service that uses covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology of any system;

- (1) This clause does not prohibit contractors from providing-
 - (i) A service that connects to the facilities of a third-party, such as backhaul, roaming, or interconnection arrangements; or
 - (ii) Telecommunications equipment that cannot route or redirect user data traffic or permit visibility into any user data or packets that such equipment transmits or otherwise handles.
- (2) By necessary implication and regulation, the prohibitions also do not apply to:
 - (i) Covered telecommunications equipment or services that:
 - i. Are not used as a substantial or essential component of any system; and
 - ii. Are *not used* as critical technology of any system.
 - (ii) Other telecommunications equipment or services that are not considered covered telecommunications equipment or services.
- (d) Reporting requirement.
- (1) In the event Contractor identifies covered telecommunications equipment or services used as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system, during contract performance, or Contractor is notified of such by a subcontractor at any tier or by any other source, Contractor shall report the information in paragraph (d)(2) of this clause to the recipient or subrecipient, unless elsewhere in this contract are established procedures for reporting the information.
- (2) Contractor shall report the following information pursuant to paragraph (d)(l) of this clause:
